

PIRIFORMIS INJECTION

<i>What is it?</i>	A piriformis is a injection of a local anesthetic (numbing agent) into the piriformis muscle of your buttock. This muscle attaches to the side of the sacrum, which is the flat bone at the base of your spine just above your tailbone.
<i>Why is it done?</i>	It is an injection into the area to help relieve pain, minimize spasm, and diminish inflammation that originates in a muscle around the nerves that pass near or through the piriformis muscle. This in turn may reduce your pain, numbness, tingling or other symptoms that may contribute to nerve inflammation, irritation or swelling.
<i>How is it done?</i>	When you are in the procedure room, you will be asked to lie down on a cushioned stretcher. Using a small needle the provider will inject a small amount of a solution of local anesthetic (numbing medication) into your skin. The provider will then inject a numbing medication into the muscle and small band aid is applied after the procedure is complete and may be removed at your discretion.
<i>What to wear?</i>	Please wear loose, comfortable clothing and leave all jewelry and other valuables at home.
<i>How long will it take?</i>	Please arrive 30 minutes before your appointment time. The procedure lasts about 15.
<i>Can I drive home from the procedure?</i>	NO, you cannot drive yourself home after the procedure; you must bring a driver with you or the procedure may be cancelled.
<i>Can I eat before?</i>	Yes we encourage you to eat a normal breakfast and or lunch.
<i>Should I stop taking aspirin?</i>	No.
<i>Can I take my medications?</i>	Yes
<i>Risks of this procedure include, but are not limited to:</i>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> * Pain in the area where the needle(s) was inserted. The pain can last for two to three days and can be treated by using ice and mild analgesics (pain medication) such as Motrin, Naprosyn or Tylenol. * <i>Bleeding, infection and/or bruising in the injection area. Increased pain</i> * A reaction to the local anesthetic including but not limited to: allergic reaction to the anesthetic medication, loss of consciousness, depressed breathing and cardiac arrest resulting in transport to the emergency room. * Temporary numbness or weakness in one or both legs. This is normal. * Nerve damage, paralysis, stroke and even death.

Will I receive a pre-procedure phone call?	A nurse from our office will call you 24-48 hours prior to your procedure. She will ask you a few important medical questions, AND she will confirm your appointment. We must have a verbal confirmation from you 24-48 hours prior to your procedure. Failure to return our call could result in your procedure being rescheduled.
Where can I obtain more procedure information?	Please visit our website www.nyspineandwellness.com . It contains demonstrations of some of the procedures we offer. We also have other helpful information.
Can I drive home from the procedure?	<input type="checkbox"/> You MUST have a ride home, and your driver should remain on site. You must not drive or operate heavy machinery for 24 hours.
Can I eat breakfast or lunch?	Yes, you can eat a light breakfast or light lunch
Should I stop taking aspirin?	If you take ASPIRIN or products containing ASPIRIN for PAIN or HEADACHES , you MUST STOP 7 days prior to procedure. Products include but are not limited to: EXCEDRIN, FIORINAL, AND ALKA SELTZER, etc).
Can I take the aspirin prescribed for <u>cardiac</u> and or <u>stroke</u> prevention?	<input type="checkbox"/> Yes, you can continue to take your aspirin for cardiac or stroke prevention, not to exceed 325mg per day.
Can I take my blood thinner?	Yes you may.
Can I take my other medications?	Yes, take your medications as your normally do.
What time is my procedure?	You will receive a phone call one or two business days prior to your procedure to remind you of the time you should arrive for your procedure (usually 30-40 minutes prior to the scheduled time) and the location. PLEASE BE ON TIME. *some patients may receive a call to confirm insurance information.
How long will it take?	15 minutes.
What do I bring?	You must bring the following <u>each time</u> you have a procedure: 1. Your current insurance information 2. A written list of all your current medications including the strength and frequency you take them. Please include over the counter medication, vitamins and herbal supplements.
What shall I wear?	Please wear comfortable loose fitting clothing.
Can I wear jewelry?	No. Please leave all jewelry and other valuables at home. We are unable to store them safely. Any body- piercing jewelry must be completely removed, as this may interfere with the x-ray machine.
What do I do if I am ill or have to cancel?	Please call the office 24 hours in advance if you are unable to keep your appointment. (315) 552-6700. We do charge patients for no shows.
